Rinpoche from Bhutan to offer rituals and ceremonies from the traditions of the Tibetan Buddhists. The Sand Mandala is one of the oldest sacred art traditions of the Tibetan Buddhism. Mandala is a Sanskrit word meaning World in Harmony. This Bhutanese Sand Mandala will be created by hand over about a week.

Crossroads Carnegie Art Center invites you to experience the ceremony and cultural traditions of Tibetan Buddhism through the construction and dismantling of a Sand Mandala, the form of this Sand Mandala the Chenrezig Buddha of Compassion.

During the week long events and construction of the Sand Mandala all are welcome to come view the construction and recite "Om Mani Padme Hung" a Chenrezig Prayer of Compassion which helps heal suffering and bestows love, compassion and generosity.



As soon as the Mandala is completed a deconstruction ceremony takes place and the Mandala is dismantled.

This dismantling demonstrates the principle of the impermanence of things.

We hope everyone will find time to view and share in this unique opportunity of experiencing the century's old Tibetan art forms and traditions.

You will have a wonderful chance to view and purchase high quality arts and crafts handpicked in Nepal, India and Bhutan.

Time: 2:00 to 4:00pm – Introduction to the Sand Mandala A short film will be available for viewing which describes the preparation of the Sand Mandala.

Time: 7:00 to 9:00pm – Karma Rinpoche will talk about the sacred art tradition of the Sand Mandala

Monday, July 20, 2015 Day 1: Sand Mandala Construction

Time: 10:00am to 1:00pm – Drawings of the Sand Mandala onto Board

Before laying down the sand on the Mandala Board, a map of the Mandala is drawn. The lines on the board are architecturally drawn. This is very exacting work that takes about three hours to complete.

Time: 1:00pm – Construction Ceremony

Once the map of the Mandala is finished, a consecration ceremony is completed to purify the space and cultivate blessings of the Buddhas.

Time: 2:00pm - Beginning of Laying Sand

After the consecration, laying of the sand begins and construction of the Sand Mandala commences.

Time: 3:00pm - Chokhor Duchen Celebration

Today is the day the Bhuddha first turned the Wheel of Dharma in Sarnath India. On this day the effects of positive or negative actions are multiplied ten million times.

Time: 4:00pm – Karma Rinpoche Birthday Celebration

Today is Karma Rinpoche's Birthday – We invite you to celebrate with a candle offering and a sweet treat.

Tuesday, July 21, 2015 Day 2: Sand Mandala Construction

Time: 10:00am to 5:00pm – Stop in and view the progress of the Sand Mandala

Time: 7:00 to 9:00pm – Karma Rinpoche will give instructions on the techniques of calm meditation.

Wednesday, July 22, 2015 Day 3: Sand Mandala Construction

Sunday, July 26, 2015 Day 7: Invitation to Guru Rinpoche's Dance and Sand Mandala Dismantle Ceremony and Sand Mandala Dispersing Ceremony

We invite you to share in the experience of Bhutan's rich cultural dance and music traditions.

Time: 3:00 to 4:00pm – Sand Mandala Dismantle Ceremony *Time:* 4:00 to 5:00pm – Sand Mandala Dispersing Ceremony

One half of the sand will be placed in small packets to be given to those who attended as blessings for their personal health and healing. The monks will pour the other half of sand into a specially prepared vessel. The monks accompanied by guests will then take the sand to be offered to a flowing body of water (Powder River) where it will bless the species in the water, our local area, all of Oregon and the world. Special prayers are recited and offerings are given to the river during the ceremony.
